A Historic Milestone: Blackfoot Crossing Historical Park's **Indigenous Perspective in Textile Conservation at NATCC**

 $B_{\text{was both delighted and honored}}^{\text{lackfoot Crossing Historical Park}}$ to have received an invitation to participate in the prestigious North American Textiles Conservators Conference (NATCC). This exceptional opportunity allowed the park to show-case its dedication to cultural preservation and its pivotal role in repatriating Chief Crowfoot's regalia from the RAM Museum in Exeter England. The paper, titled "REPATRIATING CHIEF CROWFOOT'S REGALIA FROM EXE-TER, UK TO THE SIKSIKA NATION: CONSIDERATIONS FROM A CULTURAL AND CONSERVATION POINT OF VIEW," authored by Sasheen Wright and Gail Niinimaa, represented a significant milestone in cultural heritage and conservation efforts. Shilo Clark, a representative from Blackfoot Crossing Historical Park, journeyed to Colonial Williamsburg to present, alongside Gail Niinimaa, this ground-breaking paper at the NATCC. The event was a convergence of textile conservators and professionals from the museum community hailing from across North America and overseas, making it an ideal platform for the spreading of knowledge and the celebration of cultural heritage. What made this presentation particularly remarkable was that it was the only paper with an indigenous subject at heart had been presented at the NATCC. This achievement signified a significant step towards recognizing the importance of indigenous perspectives and contributions in the

field of textile conservation. It was a testament to the increasing inclusivity and diversity of the NATCC, showcasing the conference's commitment to embracing indigenous culture and heritage in its discourse. The paper, by Sasheen Wright and Gail Niinimaa, delved into the intricate and multifaceted process of repatriating Chief Crowfoot's regalia from the United Kingdom to the Siksika Nation. This undertaking was not merely a matter of transporting artifacts but a complex endeavor encompassing cultural, historical, and conservation aspects. The presentation emphasized the need to approach repatriation with a deep under standing of the cultural significance of the items involved and the conservation requirements necessary to ensure their preservation for future generations. The response from the attendees was overwhelmingly positive, and the presentation generated valuable discussions, insights, and shared experiences. It fostered a sense of collaboration and solidarity among professionals dedicated to preserving cultural heritage. The presentation also highlighted the importance of acknowledging indigenous perspectives in conservation efforts and inspired new possibilities for collaboration. As a result of this momentous event, Blackfoot Crossing Historical Park looks forward to further collaborations and partner ships with the connections made at the NATCC. This presentation serves as a testament to the ongoing commitment of Blackfoot Crossing Historical Park to the preservation and celebration of Siksika heritage, while also contributing to the broader field of textile conservation and cultural repatriation. 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First Snowfall at Blackfoot Crossing




